

An overwhelming majority of voters opposes Congressional efforts to overturn smog standards

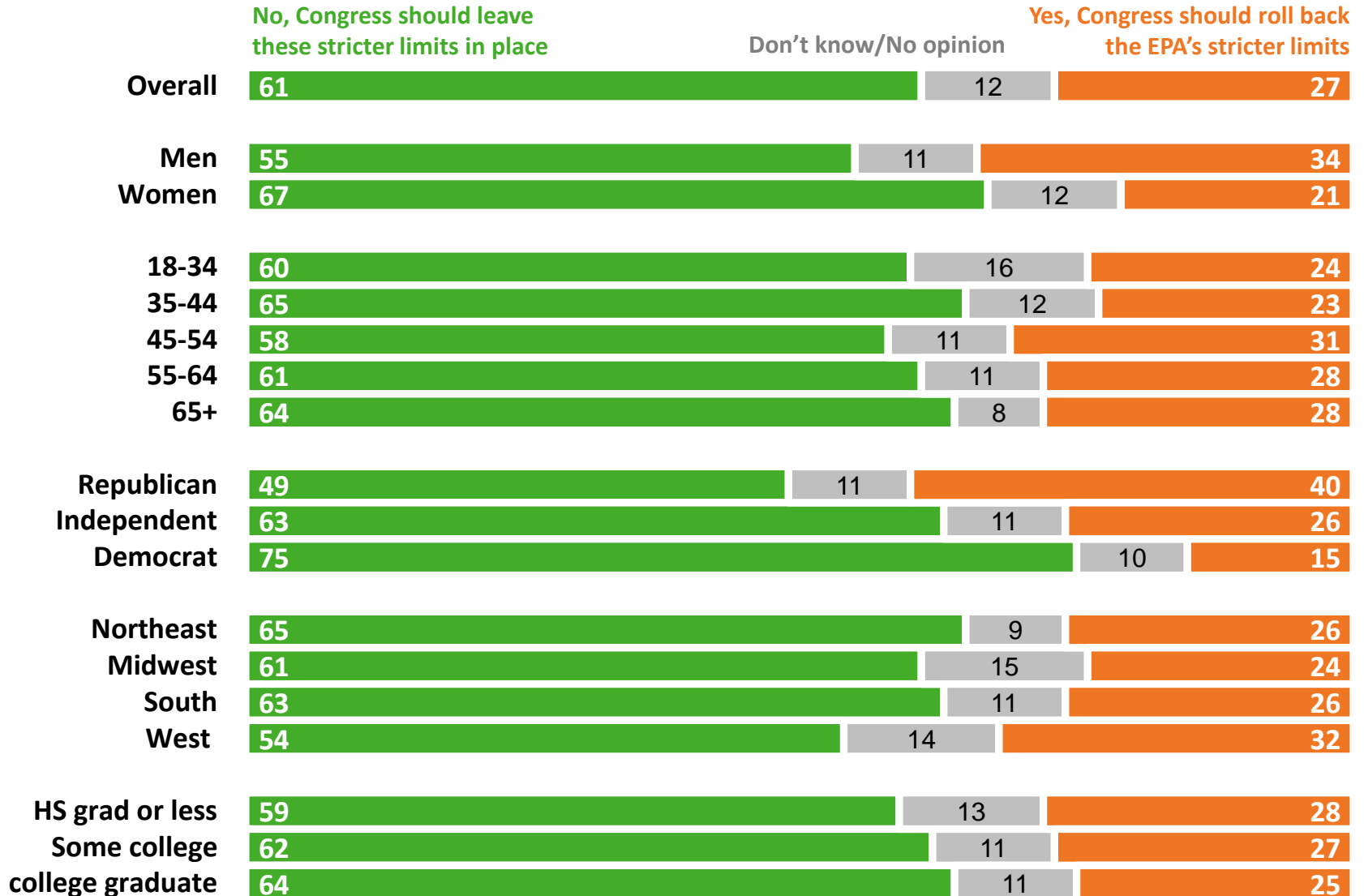
Vote for EPA Restrictions (Initial)

A solid majority of voters across demographic and partisan groupings favor keeping the EPA's pollution standards in place.

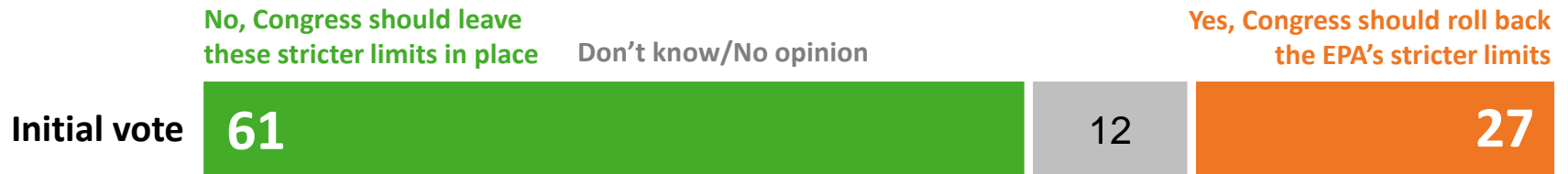
Vote for EPA Restrictions (Initial)



Support for the EPA restrictions remains strong after a balanced debate

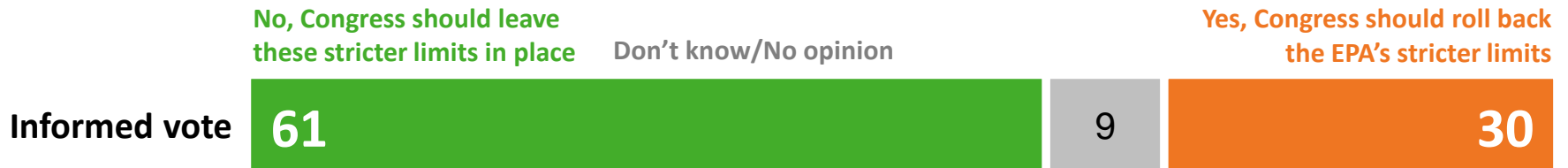
Vote for EPA Restrictions (Initial and Informed)

Some people say that, according to scientists, **these updated standards will prevent hundreds of premature deaths and hundreds of thousands of additional asthma attacks every year by holding polluters accountable for their actions.** If Congress were to roll back these standards, they would be keeping parents in the dark about the true impact of air pollution on their children.

Other people say these new regulations will not improve air quality any faster, but they will hurt the economy by imposing unrealistic requirements on virtually every part of the nation. **These will be the most expensive regulations ever, costing billions of dollars a year, raising electricity bills, and placing millions of American jobs at risk.**
