*Latino and Black populations are regularly targeted by the tobacco industry through targeted marketing and price manipulation. The policies outlined in this report are ways in which local communities can fight back. Elected officials in these communities have stepped up to tell the tobacco industry that their residents are not up for grabs.*

The most representative community is Pasadena with a median income and racial diversity that most resembles California statewide.
