

2021 Illinois Radon Poster Contest

Opportunity for Students

Radon is a colorless, odorless, tasteless, radioactive gas produced by the natural decay of uranium in the soil. Exposure to elevated radon levels increases the risk of developing lung cancer. Radon is the leading cause of lung cancer among non-smokers and is the number one cause of death in homes, surpassing falls, poisoning, fires, choking, and drowning. The Illinois Emergency Management Agency estimates that 1,160 Illinois citizens die from radon related lung cancer each year. By participating in this activity, students will learn about radon and how to reduce their risk of exposure.

In order to spread the message about radon's health hazards, the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Radon Program along with the American Lung Association, CanSAR, and Respiratory Health Association of Metropolitan Chicago host the annual statewide Illinois Radon Poster Contest. We are once again calling on Illinois citizens ages 9-14 to create a radon poster that will increase public awareness of radon gas and encourage other Illinoisans to test their homes.

A state committee will select the top three winning posters from the entire state of Illinois to receive awards.

1st place winner will receive \$200 2nd place winner will receive \$150 3rd place winner will receive \$100

Topics: (Please use one of the following set topics as a "theme" for your poster)

- What is radon?
- Where does radon come from?
- How does radon get into our homes?
- Radon can cause lung cancer
- Test your home for radon

What the judges are looking for:

- Accuracy of poster content
- Correct spelling
- Reproducibility of poster
- Originality of poster (Does not resemble a past winner)
- Poster is aesthetically pleasing

Requirements:

- Be original
- Student's name is not on the front
- Topic and title must be on the Artwork Submission Form (1 copy included!)
- White paper 12 x 18 and 8.5 x 11 sizes are preferred, but all sizes will be accepted
- Can be created with crayon, markers, paint, collage, photographs or computer graphics
- Lettering and message should be large enough to reproduce well.
- All pencil markings erased
- Copyrighted characters, product logos and trademarked or brand names cannot be used
